MAYOR'S REPORT - COUNCILLOR PIERS BROWN

What a year! Last month we completed the task reviewing every policy and procedure in the Town Council so that it is a model of best governance. This has resulted in us being able to submit an application for the Quality Gold status of the Local Council Award Scheme. The Council was even featured in the 'The Clerk' for its new governance arrangements. We went out of our way to invest in our passionate staff to ensure they had the skills they wanted to excel in their roles, to ensure that protection was put in place to stop bullying from members of the public and to give them confidence to use their initiative to deliver better projects for the town. We are now confident that we are handing over the best possible Council to whoever wins the election in May.

The Neighbourhood Plan has just started its first set of consultations, to get as much feedback as possible. The Neighbourhood Plan allows the town of Shaftesbury to add additional planning policies and requirements to the planning system for the town. Our bid to acquire a new public open space in 'The Wilderness' was sadly unsuccessful, the land eventually sold for £100k, almost twice the asking price. The council set aside £80,000 for the acquisition and an extra £17,000 was kindly donated by many members of the public to add to the councils offer. A massive thank you to all those community minded people who were willing to donate their money for this potential project.

Shaftesbury Town Council has been working with representatives of the business community and development experts from across the community on 'Project Belle'. Following a series of consultation exercises, resident and business feedback, the conclusion is that people want to see the Bell Street supermarket building brought back to life in some way. The whole project has been designed around the principle that the building will be self-funding and not cost the taxpayer a penny. Whilst there are no definitive outcomes for the project at this stage, a number of options are being explored these options include: retail, affordable housing, flexible space, enterprise hub, start-up units and a commercial leisure offer.

Shaftesbury Town Council has just set another below inflation Council Tax. There will be a 0% change in the Town Council's part of your Council Tax bill next year. In real terms, over the last 4 years, the Town Council's tax will have decreased. We have done this while improving and expanding services by being careful with spending and increasing our commercial income opportunities - Great news for hard working families!

I would like to thank everyone in the Town Hall team for their support during the year, from my fellow councillors, the office staff and the groundsmen. You all make a great team and should be proud of what we have achieved over the last 4 years.

Whilst writing this, two things have yet again struck me. *One* - So much of what our Town Council does is dependent on or more successful because of the way that we work with community together. *Two* - What a selfless and volunteer minded population we have here in Shaftesbury.

You are what makes Shaftesbury special! Thank you!

GENERAL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE – CHAIRMAN: COUNCILLOR TIM COOK

Once again I would like to thank committee members for keeping debate and discussion focussed and meetings short and also thank the Town Clerk and her team for keeping us informed of all relevant detail. I have listed here some of the decisions that the committee took throughout the year.



May 2018

We resolved to work closely with Shaftesbury Football Club to address outstanding issues and help them get back on a sound business footing.

The committee agreed to pay community grants of £20,912.80 and recommended to Full Council to provide Service Level Agreements for the Citizen's Advice Bureau and Shaftesbury and District Tourist Association.



June 2018

We resolved to apply to North Dorset District Council to have the Westminster Memorial Hospital placed on the district council's Assets of Community Value Register.

July 2018

The committee was given a presentation by 3 representatives from National Citizens Service about a community project which would consist of a sensory garden at Great Ground. A team of 13 young people plus 2 leaders later carried out the work to

make it happen.

September 2018

We resolved to engage Peninsula, on a five-year contract, to provide the Council's Health and Safety provision.

The committee recommended to Full Council that the Revenue Budget was accepted and all of the Council's capital projects are identified and supported with a SMART sheet.

It was resolved to accept the offer of the Hovis Loaf from Shaftesbury Charitable Trust and to negotiate with them details regarding donations.

January 2019

The committee resolved to write off the outstanding debt with the Task Force and noted that governance

improvements had been made to mitigate risk of recurrence.

We resolved to adopt the following policies Health and Safety

Equality, Diversity and Human Rights

Staff and Member Training

It was resolved to adopt the project plan for the Bell Street Public Toilets.





The committee resolved to hold a public information meeting and drop-in session to encourage people to stand for Council in the coming elections.

PLANNING AND HIGHWAYS COMMITTEE – CHAIRMAN: COUNCILLOR PIERS BROWN

The Planning and Highways Committee members are: Councillor Piers Brown [Chair]; Councillor Lester Taylor [Vice Chair]; Councillors Anthony Austin, John Lewer, and Philip Proctor

Over the last 12 months Planning & Highways have been working to ensure that Shaftesbury Town Council has continued to have a productive working relationship with the local planning authority - North Dorset District Council. We have commented on over 75 applications ensuring that a local voice is heard on every planning application in Shaftesbury. A big thank you to all the residents who came to see us when they felt strongly about an application.





We have worked closely with Dorset County Council - The Highways Authority, to help report potholes and other Highways issues, as well as feeding in to effect slight modifications to the layout of Bell Street, when they recently resurfaced it.

We have also tried to engage with developers before their planning applications are submitted in the hope of improving their plans before they commit to them. Whether this will be successful, only time with tell, but we believe it is worth a try

in the hope of mitigating issues. A team including the neighbourhood plan advisory committee, open spaces group and the town council have been working closely in particular with the developers of the Littledown site over the past few months.

A lot of effort in the last year has focused on getting and installing a Speed Indicator Device (SID). A SID is one of the flashing signs that shows motorists their speed if they are speeding. There have been a lot of hurdles to jump over on this process, including collating a list of potential sites, which we formed from all the comments we had had over the years and a number of residents came along to our meetings to suggest more.

The Council commissioned traffic surveys to get a detailed understanding of the speed profiles on each road and whether those speed profiles fulfilled the highways authority criteria. The criteria must average 10% + 2 mph over the speed limit. We are now in the final stage of installing the device, we will be rotating the location of the new SID, in the hope that the surprise factor will make it more effective.



RECREATION, OPEN SPACES AND ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE – CHAIRMAN: COUNCILLOR GEORGE HALL

We have had a very successful year with the implementation of a number of projects throughout the town this year. Some of the highlights include

- The installation of the new path at St James Park was to meet the desire line which was walked by many people and provide a firm footing. There were lessons learned from this project and communication and consultation is now high on our priority list. The path is however very well used and welcomed by many.
- Installation of the new play equipment at the Enmore Green Play Area
- We have undertaken a survey of all the trees on Town Council land, assessing the health and anticipated works needed. This important piece of work not only helps to manage the health and safety element but also ensures that the Council can be proactive with its budget management in looking after its trees.
- Wild ABOUT Shaftesbury, a competition for ecological and biodiverse community proposals is being launched as we speak
- The development of allotments on the A30 is progressing well and we should have fresh veg growing in them later this year.
- Land at Mampitts Square is due to transfer to the Council within the next month. We have already carried out a local consultation, have also built evidence of need through the Neighbourhood Plan work and will shortly be starting a comprehensive consultation and engagement exercise for this land.
- ROSE has worked very closely with the Visitor Experience Advisory Committee in setting this
 committee up and we are looking forward to driving the town forward and becoming the "High
 Point of Dorset"

One of the disappointments of the year was the failure to acquire The Wilderness land that came up for auction at the end of 2018, though what this project did show was the amazing level of support in Shaftesbury for the open spaces and how deeply the are loved.

As members of the ROSE committee we have to say a massive thank you to the Grounds Team and Zoe and Tracy in the office for co-ordinating all these activities. They have worked especially hard this year and their results have been amazing.

Thanks very much for all the support we have received, especially from the Open Spaces Group and the Tree Group, who have been amazing.



HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEE – CHAIRMAN: COUNCILLOR ANDY PERKINS

The level of disharmony and discord meant that Council could not represent the community of Shaftesbury as it expected and as it deserved.


We have now had a long period of harmony and collaboration so enabling the council to work very well for our community.

It is hard to believe that it is a year ago that a group of volunteers held their hands up to help Shaftesbury produce its own Neighbourhood Plan. Since then, the committee has covered a huge amount of ground engaging with the community and numerous national and local organisations involved in Town Planning and Design.

We have held monthly group meetings to review progress and exchange new ideas and we have held quarterly meetings open to the public. We have drawn from the work undertaken 2 years ago by the original group and undertaken two successful public consultation sessions checking that the policies which we are working on meet the expectation of the Shaftesbury community.

We have arranged the content of the plan around 5 key themes; Town Centre, Community and Leisure, Housing and Employment, Green Infrastructure and Design and Heritage. The policies aims and intentions were recently tested via 20+ consultation events and the policy content will be modified over the coming weeks based on the feedback from this exercise. Following the policy development stage there will be a six-week statutory consultation phase prior to submitting the draft plan to the Local Planning Authority. Post this phase the plan will go through an independent examination to ensure the plan is scrutinised to ensure it meets the various statutory requirements.



Once the plan has been through its independent examination, the community will have a vote on whether the new Unitary Authority for Dorset should adopt the plan as part of the Statutory Development Plan for Shaftesbury. If adopted, it will be used to guide their decisions on future planning applications in the area. It will also be used by Shaftesbury Town Council as a basis for their response to planning applications and to ensure that their planning decisions reflect the viewpoint of Shaftesbury residents.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow Advisory Committee members for all the hard work and commitment to the plan over the course of 2018. I look forward to sharing how the plan continues to develop over the coming months so later this year we have an adopted Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan in place.

VISITOR EXPERIENCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE - CHAIRMAN:

The Visitor Experience Advisory Committee has made excellent progress in its inaugural year. Our volunteers are committed to working with Shaftesbury Town Council and our stakeholders to ensure that Shaftesbury's importance as a tourism destination is recognised. We are passionate about embracing any opportunity to improve our tourism offer and spread awareness of our special and historic town. We are lucky to have representation from within a wide range of tourism-related businesses and heritage assets on our team. Our collective tourism-related and sector experience is significant. This knowledge around the table proves invaluable when assessing and analysing evidence and making a recommendation to Council on tourism matters.

When asked to list year's successes, I would put the completion of the Bell Street public toilets refurbishment at the top. This has been completed within budget. We have spent fewer pennies! At the time of writing, this project is on target for completion in time for the tourism season. Whilst taking time to visit public conveniences during my travels

around the West Country last spring I learned how many local authorities have been forced to close these vital facilities. Those closures impacting negatively on many tourism-reliant towns. I'm proud that we have been able to respond to the tourism sector's request for the council to maintain these facilities. But more importantly, we have improved these facilities, to enhance the visitor experience. They'll be lovely loos!

The partnership with the project team Build Love, a not-for-profit organisation which exists to provide skills training for Guys Marsh Prison inmates, has been ground-breaking. And I'm very proud that this initiative could potentially change lives for the better.



We have undertaken a detailed visitor survey which has provided invaluable data and evidence which challenges our own preconceptions on tourism. We've established an elegant framework for questioning the public using pre-programmed tablets which helps the environment and saves public money, reducing the need for paper, eliminating printing costs and which saves time in data input, making analysis easier. Despite what Shaftesbury residents may believe; our visitors do not perceive

there to be a problem with parking. The vast majority of our survey respondents found finding a space easy. We now have a much clearer picture of why people come to our beautiful town, their movement through our town and how long they stay here. This data is crucial in helping us determine how to extend the stay of

visitors in the future and that, of course, will impact on how much our guests spend here. A major piece of work to scope the necessary signposting of our services and attractions is underway and this has been fuelled by the evidence of these survey responses. We have already compiled a database of redundant or unnecessary signage which could be removed to reduce visual clutter. A team has also embarked on a programme of sign cleaning, in partnership with the Town Council Groundworks team. It's a simple concept but it makes a difference.

There is so much more work to do but I am pleased that we are making headway in our mission to ensure continued vitality within the tourism economy because everybody in Shaftesbury benefits.



ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE - CHAIRMAN:

The Economic Development Advisory Committee (EDAC) came into being in October 2018, with a remit to bring to the Town Council well researched suggestions for the economic development of our town. The group consists of members drawn from the Chamber of Commerce, Shaftesbury Civic Society, Skills and Learning, the Swan's Trust, local business people and residents with an interest in economic development. The intention is that EDAC will work closely, and in tandem, with the other advisory groups, Neighbourhood Plan and Visitor Experience.

Our specific focus during these early months has been Project Belle. This project has been focussed on the acquisition of the former supermarket building in Bell Street and its subsequent redevelopment, a community-led project which could provide the town with a re-vitalised and repurposed building in community ownership. During some weeks of pretty frantic activity, and with

invaluable professional assistance, a feasibility study/business plan has been produced. Due to considerable time pressures, Shaftesbury Town Council agreed to make a bid for the building in order to try to secure it for the community and in due course to lease it to a newly established community interest organisation. That bid was placed on 7th December 2018 and up to the time of producing this report, 28th February 2019, there has been no news as to the success or failure of this bid.



Nevertheless, the members of EDAC would like to record our thanks to the Town Council, both members and staff alike, for their energy, enthusiasm and willingness to look at innovative ways of achieving a project which could prove to be of immense benefit to the town. This model of working together, now it has been established, could work well for other sites and schemes.

EDAC will be considering other economic development issues in the weeks and months to come, including the future of the A30 employment site, parking in the town and the development of skills and training opportunities for our young people. I am pleased to be the chair of such an inspiring and energetic group who have shown themselves willing to devote their voluntary efforts towards the benefit of the community.

The Annual Report 2018-2019 Shaftesbury & District Branch Royal British Legion

Welfare

The operations team in the area has had a busy year in Dorset, Hampshire and the Isle of Wight. We have assisted 1,642 individuals, with a range of issues and growing complex needs. As cuts to statutory services deepen, those most vulnerable in our communities are in need of our support more than ever over recent years.

During 2018 the following was recorded nationally.

- Our contact centre has had 187,328 requests for help, made via phone, email and live chat.
- Individuals benefited from the Legion's Family Breaks Service: 4,356.
- Visits to our Pop-In Centres: 90,368.
- Admiral Nurses gave dementia care to 1,314 new cases.
- Benefits, Debt and Money Advice service: Supported 2,469 beneficiaries. Giving a huge £8.7 million in financial outcomes.
- Our grants programme funded £2.04 million in external grants reaching 24,327 beneficiaries.
- 375 people attended our Battle Back Centre for the recovery from war injuries.
- Our Handy Van service supported 4,684 beneficiaries.
- 5,741 attended the RBL Break Centres, and a further 1,153 individuals attended Adventure Breaks.

None of this vital and life changing work could happen without the funds raised for the Poppy Appeal and all of the Volunteers we have, who give up so much of their own time. The main categories for areas of need in terms of funds spent for the area are, Housing, Mobility and household goods (carpets, furniture, etc.). The average age of those assisted covering all categories is 60 years old.

Poppy Appeal

The Shaftesbury & District Branch total at the end of September 2018 was £23,836.35, an increase of 10.1% over last year. Dorset's total was £717,429, an increase of 4.8%.

Shaftesbury Trinity Centre Trust 2018/2019 Report

We are a charitable Trust founded to support the change of use of the Trinity Church in Bimport, Shaftesbury. The church was declared redundant in 1974 and is now the base for the Shaftesbury Scouts, the Day Centre for the elderly and three small businesses.

The objectives of our charity are:

- a) To provide suitable headquarters accommodation for the Shaftesbury Scout Group; and
- b) To promote any charitable purposes for the benefit of the community of Shaftesbury in the County of Dorset and the districts surrounding Shaftesbury with special regard to the needs of the elderly.

Trustees are selected because of skills they can bring to the Trust and for their knowledge of the town and its inhabitants.

The maintenance and upkeep of the entire building and of two thirds of the churchyard are also the responsibility of the Trust. Monies are raised by letting all the areas, apart from the Scout Hall on the first floor, and from 40 car parking spaces around the building. Any residue is then distributed to the community which can be other charities, associations and individuals. In its early years, the Trust supported the setting up of two properties for the care of the elderly – Castle Hill House and The Cedars – and towards the recent opening of a special dementia unit. Shaftesbury Arts Theatre and Shaftesbury Museum were recent recipients of major grants as well as smaller donations for the needs of the individual. Grants are allocated at the quarterly meeting of the Trustees, although there is a special Chairman's grant which can be given in between meetings to respond quickly to an emergency.

We have extensively upgraded the Trinity Hall including the installation of a lift to the first floor and the general upgrading of the entire area including kitchen and toilets. Update on Service - January 2019

We took over running the service in October 2018, originally the takeover date should have been 1 November but Debbie Simmons, the previous coordinator had to pass everything over due to personal circumstances. Since then the scheme has completed over 250 journeys ranging from early morning pick ups at 6.00 a.m. to evening pick-ups at 7.00 p.m.



Christmas Eve was a particularly busy day starting with our first pick up at 6.00 a.m. taking a lady to Salisbury Hospital then returning to Shaftesbury to pick another lady up and take her to Woking to stay with her Brother over the festive period. Whilst we try to adhere to the '48 hour' rule, this is not always possible. For instance, we had a call from a distressed lady whose Mother had been taken into Salisbury Hospital the evening before and needed collecting, in her nightie, and bringing home. All this on a Sunday morning!

We have now been successful in receiving sponsorship from Shaftesbury Charitable Trust and more recently from Williams. We have approached the Rotary Club but are still waiting to hear from them. We have also applied to Tesco under their 'bags of help' scheme for £3,000 towards a wheelchair accessible vehicle. Dorset County Council have said that we may well be able to claim support from them under a 'match' scheme.

We have in fact already purchased, out of our own funds, a wheelchair accessible vehicle which is already proving very popular. Not only does it take wheelchairs but also has a remote-control electric front seat which swivels so that the less infirm do not have to struggle to get their legs into the vehicle.

A further big development is that we were asked if we would like to affiliate with Shaftesbury Royal British Legion. At present they only affiliate with junior schemes and we will be the first adult scheme to receive such accreditation. Not only that but the Shaftesbury branch took this higher to their headquarters in London who have approved affiliation with the Royal British Legion nationally. We will be the first adult scheme in the whole of the United Kingdom to affiliate. Whilst they will not interfere with the running of the scheme, we are entitled to use any of their resources, skills and knowledge, to enable us to progress further. They are helping us investigate becoming a registered charity as we believe this will help us in many ways. We are extremely proud of this achievement which has recognised our enthusiasm to help and support our local community.

Only yesterday Gillingham Car Link Scheme approached us to help with a joint marketing enterprise as they feel ours has been so successful. We will therefore be able to provide a more complementary service to each other and be able to support each other. We are meeting with them next week to discuss this in more detail.

Finally, we would like to thank the Transport Forum for their very kind donation which has helped us to get the scheme off the ground so successfully.

Shaftesbury Abbey

It is already a year since the 2-year SAVED Project, which the Town Council is generously supporting, began its operations, so I thought that I would send you a brief update on our progress.

2018 was an exciting year for us, beginning in January when HLF confirmed their acceptance of our application to them for grant funding of £42,900 (almost 50% of our expected costs) and gave us permission for the project to start.

One of our first major achievements was in recruiting community volunteers to the project. HLF had set us a target of recruiting 30, and by April (just after our first public meeting to advertise the project) we had recruited over 100 - we currently have 113.

During the summer we commissioned a laser-scanning and ground-penetrating-radar survey of the Abbey grounds and surrounding properties including Park Walk and the Rose Garden. However, the survey images were only received by us in late autumn and are still being analysed but early indications of several features have appeared and are leading us to further investigations.

We also held training sessions led by Dr Julian Richards for 94 archaeology volunteers, introducing them to various techniques including test-pit digging and recording. However, we wanted to carry out test-pit investigations in properties surrounding the Abbey Gardens where we believe the Abbey's wider precinct to be, and the general public are often averse to having their gardens dug up in summer! We therefore waited until autumn before commencing the test-pits: six have now been completed, with more scheduled, and finds include prehistoric flint blades, pottery, the earliest dating from the 11th century, and three medieval silver coins.

Historic England visited us in autumn and offered very helpful advice as we developed our detailed archaeological strategy for 2019 when the local schools will be involved - all 11 of them, with c.500 children! (But not all at once: phew!)

In the summer we also began our main historical research activities. 35 volunteer researchers (some of whom are also involved in the archaeology activities) began scouring our archives and others around the UK for new information about Shaftesbury Abbey and its people. Teams of researchers have visited Winchester, Romsey, Malmesbury, Salisbury and London, and their research continues. Meanwhile we commissioned Dr Jonathan Foyle to be our architectural historian and review the stonework that we hold at Shaftesbury.

These activities are discovering much that is new which we will be incorporating in the reinterpreted and redeveloped Abbey Museum towards the end of this year when we will be designing and developing the new

displays, information panels and educational

resources.

Shaftesbury Abbey Primary School, St James' St, Shaftesbury

The Abbey School has had an excellent year, with a great set of SATs results for our oldest children in May 2018, the acquisition of a new field and barn and the appointment of a new Head teacher for September 2018. Mr Michael Salisbury started in the Autumn term and has quickly identified further enhancements to be made to the academic curriculum, the wider provision for the children and the development of the school buildings and grounds. Some highlights from the year:



The School Plays

The oldest children in the school kept us on the edge of our seats with

'Mystery at Magpie Manor' – who had stolen the Pica Pica solid silver pitcher with a magpie picture? They built suspense with masterful performances: spoken and sung. Year 2, 3 and 4 shared the Christmas Story with their performance of 'Straw and Order'. Some brilliant comic moments and delightful singing reminded us what Christmas is all about. Finally Reception and Year 1 charmed their audience with 'Whoops a Daisy Angel', showing great confidence learning their lines and performing to a packed hall.

The SASMA (Shaftesbury Area Schools Music Association) Carol service

On Tuesday 27th November children from our school choir joined children and staff from other local schools at St Peter's Church for a very festive carol service. Musical accompaniment was skilfully provided by pupils and teachers from Shaftesbury School, along with some other musical friends of SASMA. One of the highlights was a rousing and very fast version of the 12 Days of Christmas, complete with actions! The children enjoyed singing together and having a free hot chocolate (donated by Costa) and a doughnut (donated by Tesco).

Visits to all our local Residential Homes

Just before Christmas, each of our 7 classes went to visit a different residential home in Shaftesbury. The classes performed Christmas Carols and songs which they had prepared in advance of the visits. Feedback from the residents was really enthusiastic, the children and staff also really enjoyed their visits and were treated to refreshments by the staff of the residential homes. It is wonderful to get our young people together with older Shaftesbury citizens; the enjoyment and benefit is mutual.

New Forest School sessions

Over the past few weeks the school has developed a new Forest School site in the grounds, with help from parents, governors, children and staff. Two classes at a time are taking it in turns to learn the skills of the forest with a special tutor leading the sessions.

School Pond

Thanks to a donation of £4000 from Tesco, we are redeveloping the school pond which had fallen into disrepair over the last few years. It is getting a complete make-over this Spring and should be open to the children again by the end of this school year. We hope that the newts that have been sighted in our pond will approve of the changes and be happy in their new home!

Shaftesbury Arts Centre, Chairman's Report 2018

On the 1st November 2017, Shaftesbury Arts Centre celebrated its 60th birthday with coffee and birthday cake and for the archives, we took a photo



of some of our members from the past and present. Looking back over the years we can see how the Centre has grown and grown, in size, in membership and in activities. We now have an organisation, still run entirely by volunteers with more than 500 members and a turnover of over £100,000 a year.

Music and Drama remains at the core of the Centre with its four major productions a year but around it have grown numerous other groups; poetry, reading, writing, art, music, dance, Pilates, yoga, keep fit, toddler groups and music and yoga for babies, to name but a few. Throughout the week the Centre is a hive of activity with not only our own groups but also with classes, conferences, parties of people and the now famous Shaftesbury Fringe who have all found the Arts Centre an attractive venue to hire.

We are desperately short of space for groups and the storage for equipment is at a premium. Juggling all these activates in too few rooms is a major task, which our volunteer, in charge of hiring, manages with incredible efficiency. Fortunately our groups are considerate and don't mind the occasional move of venue. More space is a major need for our future and we have the necessary planning permission to build new facilities on the land that we own at the rear of our site.

We had hoped for a substantial grant from Arts Council England. They urged us to go through their arduous application process but in the end found that money was short due to a change in Government policy and there were others with greater need. However, fundraising continues apace and we hope to accumulate enough funds to start the first stage of our extension in July.

Visitors are often amazed that we are run by volunteers (except, of course, our loyal cleaner) and there are so many people involved in working hard to keep the show on the road; our performers, who continue to amaze us with their talent; all the workers behind the scenes building sets, costumes, make up, props etc. etc. the buildings team and the technicians who keep the lights on and computer going, the marketeers who produce the programme and manage the website.

There are those who hire and book in shows from touring companies, the Gallery team who keep the Gallery open 50 weeks a year with ever changing artists then the Front of House team; Box Office staff, ticket checkers, programmes and ice cream sellers, staff who man and stock the bar, and the front of house managers, all warmly welcoming our audiences.

Keeping our building going and all the services working costs a great deal of time and money. We must thank the providers of our four main sources of income; Music & Drama, Gallery, Room hire and of course, the membership. Then there are the Fundraisers, who put the icing on the cake, 'Funding our Future.' We must give particular thanks to our supporters, Rutters Solicitors, Proctor, Watts, Cole and Rutter, The Shaftesbury Charitable Trust and the Town Council for their regular and supportive grants and to our advertisers for helping to pay for our programme and its distribution.

Finally, thanks to the directors who have supported me throughout the year and kept the ship on a steady course. As 'management' we have to make some difficult choices, choices that may not please all of the people all of the time but many that most people will not even know about like installing a new credit card machine, haggling with insurers or purchasing an evacuation chair. The directors have worked very hard as a team and I regard it as a privilege to have worked with them.

Gold Hill Museum EVENTS 2018 – 2019

Our temporary exhibitions for 2018 included in the Large Exhibition Room a snapshot of 1930's life on A Small Dairy Farm in the Blackmore Vale. Creator



Janet Swiss aimed to show how farming was still largely dependent on heavy manual labour. Shaftesbury-based BV Dairy kindly sponsored this exhibition and Found Underground in the Small Exhibition Room. Here you could uncover, handle and interpret sixteen mystery objects unearthed by local residents when digging their gardens and allotments. On Saturday morning 14 July Ciorstaidh Trevarthen, the Finds Liaison Officer for Dorset, was on hand in the Garden Room to help identify any found objects brought into the Museum. On Wednesday 28 March at 4.30p.m. over 40 members and friends of The Shaftesbury & District Historical Society attended the official launch party of Shaftesbury Through Time. This lavishly illustrated book by Roger Guttridge draws on photographs from the Museum Collection.

Other events included:

Saturday 05 – Friday 11 May: The annual and impressive Spring Exhibition in the Garden Room by members of Shaftesbury Camera Club.

Monday 25 June – Monday 02 July: The welcome return of the Tibetan monks of Tashi Lhunpo Monastery who created a sand mandala in the Garden Room, and then ceremonially destroyed it.

Tuesday 04 December at 5.30p.m: the official launch of Sir John Stuttard's new book on John Rutter (1796-1851): The Turbulent Quaker of Shaftesbury (published by Hobnob Press on behalf of The S&DHS, to whom the author is kindly donating the net proceeds from sales). Much of the research was conducted in the archives and library of Gold Hill Museum.

Over the winter period Gold Hill Museum offers a series of monthly lectures for members of the local history society and for the public. This continues on Tuesday 05 March 2019 at 2.30p.m. when Jack Bath, Curator, and David Caddy, Trustee, at Shillingstone Railway Museum, will give an illustrated talk on The Station They Never Closed.

Future of the Town Council and the NHS in North Dorset - 2018 - 2019 Annual Report

Looking back to the end of 2015 and the Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group's proposals for the future of the Westminster Memorial Hospital, it is a quite exceptional opportunity to reflect on the contribution this Council has made to the stability of NHS Services in North Dorset.

At the end of 2015 The Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group completed their internal review of the provision of NHS services throughout Dorset. Their proposals for the Westminster Memorial Hospital in Shaftesbury were that the remaining 16 beds should be closed. The Hospital has served the community for 135 years and closing these beds made no sense. The proposals also included other changes that were interlinked with the bed closures.

These beds serve a huge community around Shaftesbury and Gillingham and across the borders of South West Wiltshire and parts of Somerset.

Shaftesbury Town Council supported by Gillingham Town Council and the MPs (Simon Hoare from North Dorset, Andrew Murrison from South West Wiltshire and David Warburton from Somerset) and with the Save Our Beds campaign organised by Julian Prichard, challenged the DCCG to re-assess their proposals in light of evidence that they had failed to assess fully the needs for the cross-border communities and for the Shaftesbury population. The "Public Consultation" process response overwhelmingly supported the challenge.

When the DCCG announced their decisions following their evaluation of the Public Consultation in September 2016, the DCCG accepted the validity of the challenge and they agreed immediately that they would work with the community to find acceptable alternative measures – within existing resources – and for the foreseeable future retain the beds until such time as realistic resources became available.

The original role of the Town Council's Working Group has been fulfilled.

A Working Group from the NHS was formed; the Shaftesbury, Gillingham, West Wiltshire and Somerset Reference Group. This is made up from NHS experts from all fields and representatives from all the major "stakeholders" in the community. This has led to substantial benefits for the community. Pro-active treatment where the emphasis is on ensuring that people are less dependent on Acute Hospital services and where Social Services and Health Care staff are working as integrated teams.

Shaftesbury Town Council has been a participant from the start and what is now very clear is that the value to the community of the Town Council keeping a long-term interest in any future developments within the National Health Services in Shaftesbury and North Dorset, is vital. The Council should and must be involved in the years ahead. The Council has a part to play on behalf its electorate, in the way Health and Social Care services are delivered to "our" community in the future.

Collaborative working is essential. It is in all our interests. The Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group, Planning (including the Neighbourhood plan) and the Locality Healthcare System which more and more will be concentrating on proactively keeping people at home where possible.

There has been some amazing work going on in the last two years with the development of rapid response short term care in North Dorset. The integration of Social Service staff with the NHS teams has been developed and is establishing greater support for those who need input from both services.

Mental Health Services

Mental Health Services in North Dorset has been poorly served in the last few years. Melanie Costas has, single handedly and single mindedly, fought for improvements and has just announced that she has .. "been successful in my grant application to be able to launch SOMH! Save Our Mental Health as a Social Enterprise." My plan is to launch SOMH! With a series of 'pop up' information events throughout North Dorset, to engage with the wider public re tackling and challenging the inequality rural vs urban mental health support services. The longer term aim of SOMH! is to raise enough funding to be able to provide an outreach service throughout North Dorset,

using a mobile unit (or bus) to breakdown the stigma, raise awareness and provide information/signposting regarding mental health issues. Alongside this, I hope for a permanent presence on the high street such as a shop/unit in Shaftesbury or Gillingham. The bus/mobile unit would be available for hire at events or at corporations on site to promote awareness, thus raising funds to be able to reinvest back into the Social Enterprise.

General

The Town Clerk and I are members of the Shaftesbury, Gillingham, West Wiltshire and Somerset Reference Group and this link is important so that there is a constant opportunity to exchange views and information. When the new Council is active from May, a Councillor Representative would be a valuable part of the processes.

I will not be standing for the future. I have been privileged to be a member of the Council since 2011 (with a 2 year gap) and I have many friendships as a result which I value highly. The last 3 years I have concentrated on the Health issues with the Council's agreement.

This has been an eventful year for Shaftesbury Carnival, with a strong committee hard working enthusiastic members of all ages, which is the envy of many Carnival groups across the South West.

The aim of our team is to preserve the long traditions of Shaftesbury

Carnival which stretch back as you will be well aware at least 140 years,
whilst at the same time, raising valuable funds for our local groups and charities.



This year we decided to spread our donations more widely, giving smaller amounts to a larger number of groups, a decision which we are reviewing for the year ahead.

We have had to, as usual had to hold a number of fund raising events throughout the year to meet the ever rising costs of maintaining this important local event, and were dealt a savage blow in July when appalling weather, after weeks of sunshine, caused the abandonment of our car show, which is one of our most important events of the year.

The carnival itself was an amazing success, with massive crowds, hundreds of children taking part in the afternoon parade, and a brilliant evening procession, winning the prestigious award of best carnival in Wessex award. This was a wonderful accolade for our hard-working committee, and their friends who help throughout the year.

Sadly, despite the large crowds, the street collections bring in only about 20% of the direct cost of staging this event, the rest as already alluded to is raised by staging events throughout the year, and very generous sponsorship by local companies and individuals, without which there would be no carnival.

In the year ahead we will need to purchase more road signs, bunting, and many more items that wear out and need replacing but are not downhearted.

We are grateful to the town council as ever for their important and valuable support, again, without which there would be no carnival, here is to the year ahead!

Blackmore Vale Line Community Rail Partnership (BVCRP)

Blackmore Vale Line Community Rail Partnership (BVCRP) is the local rail partnership covering the stations from Tisbury to Crewkerne. The 80-mile scenic route travels across the three counties of Somerset, Dorset and Wiltshire connecting the six stations of Crewkerne, Yeovil Junction, Sherborne, Templecombe, Gillingham and Tisbury. It takes in the most picturesque countryside, skirting the ANOB Blackdown Hills, the Blackmore Vale, the Vale of Wardour and the Nadder Valley, connecting with the many walks including the Liberty Trail and National Cycle Routes along the way.



BVCRP was set up in January 2016 and officially launched in March 2016 as a result of a franchise pledge by South West Trains. BVCRP is strengthened by the commitment of South West Trains, the main funder and its responsibility for the development and implementation of a community rail strategy. The core aims are to promote the area to prospective rail passengers and to encourage community involvement by working with local people to improve the stations belonging to the rail partnership.

BVCRP is a joint enterprise involving local groups, people and businesses. It is non-profit making and its membership is open to local people and representatives of commercial, statutory and voluntary organisations who are interested in promoting its core aims.

This year has got off to a flying start and is going to be big on promotion of the partnership and of the stations along the line.

Two new leaflets have been designed, printed and are in the process of being distributed to stations, tourist organisations and local businesses. (1) Information about BVCRP & (2) How to get Involved.

The Partnership is in the process of producing its first Line Guide working with a local Graphic Designer who has been commissioned to design it. The Line Guide plans to promote and celebrate local attractions to encourage rail-users to travel to the area. Plan a launch for April/ May

The other big project of 2019 is First World War project to honour the memory of those who died during the First World War and who lived in the station towns and villages. Using an image of Waterloo Memorial as a template for our memorial plaques the aim is to produce six memorial plaques honouring the fallen railway workers of WW1.

Part 1: Work is complete - Finding and identifying those who died in the First World War for 14 towns and villages. Just under 2,000 who died have been found, identified and biographies researched. Staggering results show nearly half of these (950) are not commemorated on the village and town memorials. A new book of remembrance has been produced with this information in it. 'The Fallen of the First World War from the towns & villages of the Blackmore Vale Railway Line' which costs £15. A book launch is planned for Thursday 21st March at Castle Gardens Sherborne.

Part 2 of the project is to find and identify from the research above the names of the railway workers for the memorials. Station towns and villages in the project are: Crewkerne (& Misterton), Yeovil Junction (Barwick, Stoford, Bradford Abbas and Yeovil) Sherborne, Templecombe, Gillingham and Tisbury stations as well as the redundant stations of Dinton, Semley, Milborne Port, Yeovil Town and Sutton Bingham. We are looking for volunteers who would like to help with the research as well as reaching out to anyone who has a railway worker ancestor who died, who worked at any of the above mentioned stations, as we'd would like to honour them on one of our boards. We'd love to hear from you.

We open a couple of days during the holidays when the club is free for drop in sessions where we offer lunch that is prepared and cooked by the young people and well as putting on different activities.

Little Giants is still going strong which runs on the second Saturday of the month in the morning which is for young people and children with a range of special needs where parents and carers can come along and relax enjoy a cuppa while their children are entertained with an assortment of different activities, we have families come from as far as Bere Regis and Blandford way. St Mary's Girls School, Shaftesbury send a small group of girls to help out as part of their enrichment programme which is lovely to see able body young people mixing with the young people and children who come along to the group.

We are always fund raising to support what we do especially with the purchasing of materials for arts and crafts and buying specialist items for Little Giants.

This purpose of this report is to describe the advice provided to residents of Shaftesbury during the period April 2017 to March 2018, and to demonstrate the impact of that advice.

OUR ORGANISATION

About Us

In April 2017, North Dorset Citizens Advice merged with Citizens Advice Dorchester and Sherborne and Districts to form a new organisation: Citizens Advice Dorchester, Sherborne & Districts and North Dorset. The organisation has its registered office in Dorchester, retaining three main offices — Dorchester, Sherborne and Gillingham from where we deliver our advice service.

The organisation operates within the boundaries of North Dorset District Council and West Dorset District Council, with an overall population of 172,440¹.

Citizens Advice Dorchester, Sherborne & Districts and North Dorset is a local charity and a member of Citizens Advice nationally and Citizens Advice in Dorset (CAiD). The organisation has a Trustee board responsible for strategic development and a small management team.

The Indices of Deprivation 2010 shows that 20 areas of North Dorset are in the top 20% of deprived areas with barriers to housing and key local services, this reflects the rural nature of North Dorset where there is a population density of 117 people per km² compared to the national average of 387 people per km². We respond to this by offering services across North Dorset, including:

- Access to advice by telephone, email, and letter, by calling into drop in sessions or attending appointments at our main office in Gillingham or at one of our outreaches.
- Being part of Dorset Adviceline which is a service jointly staffed by all Dorset Local Citizens Advice offices. This allows local residents to access a phone service from 10am to 4pm from Monday to Friday.
- Providing advice that is:

- Quality assured in accordance with the National Association of Citizens Advice Bureau (NACAB) principles of independence, impartiality, confidentiality and equal opportunities
- Free of charge at the point of delivery to individuals, including statutory/voluntary agencies and private sector businesses
- Available on all subjects with the most frequent issues being welfare benefits, debt, employment and housing.

2018-19 and beyond

We continue to benefit from the merger in April 2017 which has resulted in a strong, resilient organisation making the most of our scarce resources in an efficient and effective manner. We benefit from economies of scale whilst maintaining our focus on our local communities providing a local advice service for local people.

We will continue to maintain our face to face services throughout North Dorset whilst broadening access to our advice through new technology such as Skype and webchat. We are proud of our presence in the market towns of the district and, where our resources allow, we will continue to develop these in response to increased demand.

Our service depends on the commitment of our volunteers and we will continue to recruit and train volunteers across the area to expand capacity and increase our ability to help and support local residents.

As the Dorset councils move towards unitary status, we will continue to work with other local Citizens Advice offices in Dorset and with the Citizens Advice in Dorset consortium to look for opportunities to share resources and work together more efficiently.

HOW WE SPENT YOUR MONEY

The funding you gives us enables us to continue to deliver our core advice service in the Shaftesbury area - free, confidential, independent and impartial advice to anyone, regardless of age, race, gender, ethnic origin, sexual orientation, disability or religious belief.

In particular, this means recruiting, training and supporting a team of volunteers to be able to help and support local residents with the problems they face, and also contributing substantially to our overheads - travel expenses, premises and office costs and the salaries of our small number of paid staff. <u>Appendix A</u> gives more information about our team in North Dorset.

THE SERVICE WE OFFER

In Shaftesbury, we offer drop in and appointments on Wednesday mornings, available to residents of Shaftesbury and the surrounding area. We offer the full range of advice, information and casework covering all subject areas.

Shaftesbury residents can also access our services in Gillingham and Sherborne (5 days a week), Stalbridge (Tuesday morning) and Blandford (Monday and Tuesday morning).

In addition, Shaftesbury residents can access our Dorset Adviceline telephone service from Monday to Friday 10am to 4pm or email us if that is more convenient.

WHO WE HELPED

During 2017-18, we assisted **295** clients from the Shaftesbury area, a slight fall from 334 in 2016-17. These can be shown in the following table by ward:


39% of our activity related to Shaftesbury residents in 2017-18 was face to face advice, **33**% was phone advice and **11**% was email or letter. Our remaining activity was administrative in nature.

92% of our clients from Shaftesbury were White British with **2%** from BAME backgrounds. **38%** of clients from Shaftesbury were disabled or had a long term health condition.

WHAT WE HELPED PEOPLE WITH

Clients who seek our help often have a number of different problems to resolve. In 2017-18, we dealt with a total number of **959** advice issues when assisting clients from the Shaftesbury area, a slight drop from 1,281 in 2016-17. These issues are broken down by ward in Appendix B.

The majority of issues related to welfare benefits (40%) with debt being the second highest issue. The graph on the following page shows the breakdown of areas of enquiry.



THE IMPACT WE MADE

Financial Outcomes

During 2017-18, we were successful in gaining over £108,395 in additional income for residents of the Shaftesbury area, an average of over £267 per client. An additional £1,645 was gained in re-imbursements, services and loans and £10,535 in debts written off.

Client's stories from North Dorset*

Felicity's story

Felicity was in her fifties and had suffered from severe mental health issues for a long time. In February 2017, she dropped into one of our rural outreaches with her support worker, concerned that her application for Personal Independence Payment (PIP) had been turned down, and that her Disability Living Allowance (DLA) was soon to come to an end.

We supported Felicity to apply for mandatory reconsideration but this was also turned down – she was assessed as scoring 0 points despite having support from her GP.

We then helped Felicity to appeal the decision, completing the appeal form and preparing the paperwork. Felicity's mental health support worker was prepared to attend the tribunal with her so we spent some time with her explaining what to expect.

Felicity's appeal was successful and she was awarded enhanced daily living and standard mobility PIP - over £5,400 a year.

Ezra's story

Ezra was a single father of two, living in social housing on a very low income. He had numerous debts adding up to over £14,000 exacerbated by the cost of picking up his children from their mother every weekend (a round trip of 60 miles).

Ezra came to us when he was visited by an Enforcement officer as a result of his council tax arrears, and was at risk of eviction for non payment of his rent. Since moving into the property six months before, Ezra had paid no utility bills. He wanted to get his debts under control and maximise his income so that his daughter could come and live with him.

We immediately contacted the local authority and requested a hold on the enforcement process. We also contacted the housing association and informed them that we were working with Ezra to deal with his debts. We completed a budgeting pack with him to understand his income and outgoings and encouraged him to make contact with his utility providers and request a key meter. We also made an application to the Wessex Water Assist scheme – a social tariff designed for people on low income in financial difficulties.

Finally, we helped Ezra apply for a Debt Relief Order and applied to the Lighthouse Trust charity for help with the £90 fee.

As a result of our help, Ezra's debts of £14,203 were written off and he was given a fresh start.

APPENDIX A- NORTH DORSET TEAM AND CONTACT DETAILS

North Dorset Team and Contact details

- In March 2018, we had a total of **34 volunteers, including 11 trainees**. Our volunteers fulfil a number of essential roles within the organisation, including gateway assessor, generalist adviser and administrative/support functions.
- In addition, in 2017-18, we had a Trustee Board comprising of **18 trustees/directors**. They provided the oversight for effective governance of the charity.
- The team also comprised 7 paid staff. Two of these worked in a management/supervisory role supporting the advice delivered. There were 3 caseworkers who deliver specialist projects or areas of advice. These include the advice areas of debt and welfare benefits and the projects of Sure Start Children's Centres and the GP Surgery in Sturminster Newton. Two paid staff work in support functions for the wider team.
