

The intervening year has been a busy time for all of us, but a very rewarding one. The office is now at full complement, with a new Business Manager (Mrs Brie Logan), who has been very pro-active in engaging with both the business and voluntary sectors of the community. We were also joined by Mrs Zoe Moxham, who, among her other duties, has been an indispensable Mayor's Secretary. A huge amount of work has been put into implementing the Strategic Plan this year, it has been split into four main headings with twelve manageable workstreams, one of which has been assigned to each

one of the twelve Councillors to oversee. Advisory

relevant subjects, this enables the Council to make
decisions based on expert advice on topics that they

The General Management Committee members are:

The General Management Committee advises the Council on its corporate policies, strategies and level of resources and to ensure that the financial status of the Council is maintained within agreed budgets having due regard to both revenue and capital expenditure. It holds authority for the financial planning of the Town Council and monitors performance of the



Council's Committees and services. It gives careful consideration to present and future tax payers.

Tim writes;

"The General Management Committee has had a good year. I thank the members for keeping debate and discussion focussed and meetings short and I also thank the Town Clerk and her team for keeping us informed of all relevant detail.

I'm pleased to say that we have given the go ahead to four projects that will have a lasting benefit to the people of Shaftesbury:

- New allotments on land south of the A30
- Adoption of the 5-year Strategic Plan for the town
- Setting aside land for a cycle speedway track and clubhouse, a project brought to the town by Shaftesbury Rotary Club
- Installation of a hearing loop system in the Town Hall

I am very happy that the committee has recommended to Full Council to grant £30,000 to community groups and organisations in the past year and on behalf of the committee I'd like to pay tribute to all the volunteers in the town who give their time and effort to make Shaftesbury a better place for all. At the September 2017 meeting we had presentations from the two shortlisted candidates for the new position of Business Manager and, after delegating the choice back to the original interview panel, Brie Logan finally won through. She has brought valuable skills and dynamism to the council as a whole.

At our last meeting the committee discussed updating the council's Snow and Ice Policy following the two recent periods of abnormal weather and also considered what other measures we could reasonably take to maintain access to the town for as many residents as possible if we get more snow. This is something we will need to consult on in the next municipal year."

The Planning and Highways Committee is mindful of the historic nature of the town and the natural beauty of its surroundings. It seeks to preserve the heritage that has been entrusted to the people of Shaftesbury for the benefit of future generations. It gives careful consideration to all planning applications received in consultation with



local planning and government guidance so that it might give a well informed and considered opinion to the Planning Authority. The Committee seeks to promote the conservation of the best of the historic built environment and the best possible design for any new development, including means of integration with the old town.

It's important to remember that the Town Council is a consultee on planning issues – decisions are made by the Local Planning Authority (LPA) – North Dorset District Council.

Piers writes;

"Over the last 12 months Planning & Highways have been working to ensure that Shaftesbury Town Council has continued to have productive working relationship with the local planning authority. We have commented on over 75 applications ensuring that a local voice is heard on every planning application in Shaftesbury. A big thank you to all the residents who came to see us when they felt strongly about an application.

We were contacted by a number of residents about a set of parking issues in Lyons walk, we were happy to request of Dorset County Council that double yellow lines are extended to include all of Lyons Walk and Church Lane. So, if you know of somewhere in the town that needs double yellow lines or has any other parking enquiries, please get in contact and we will happily try and help your case to Dorset County Council.

We were contacted by a number of residents about the issue of not having enough bins along Shaftesbury's High Street. I am happy to report that Shaftesbury Town Council has added more bins and has increased the size of some of the existing ones. We also have more bins in storage ready to install if required in the future.

The Recreation, Open Spaces and Environment Committee is committed to the sensitive and careful management, maintenance and improvement of the town's open spaces, recreation and amenity areas and seeks to conserve the environmental heritage entrusted to the



people of Shaftesbury for the benefit of future generations. It gives careful consideration to the strategic plans for the town's recreation, environment and amenities and is mindful of and will discharge its role with due consideration to operate within its budget and be financially accountable.

George writes;

"Having been the ROSE Chairman for two years now I have seen a huge number of successful projects completed and many more started in conjunction with the strategic plan.

Most recently we have seen the completion of the new pathway at St James park, for which many residents especially ones with pushchairs are very appreciative of.

The Council is currently in the process of deciding the specification for new railings for Jubilee steps. We are looking at using local blacksmiths, some of whom have already put forward some fantastic ideas to incorporate, including some creative designs highlighting the heritage and history of Shaftesbury.

We have been working effectively with local organisations on projects such as traditional fingerpost signage for walks in Shaftesbury and the aim longer term is to produce a beautiful map of

The Human Resources Committee will advise the Council on all human resources matters relating to the Council and its staff team. The Town Council employs eight staff who are all based in Shaftesbury. The staff are divided into three departments – office, grounds and swimming pool. The office staff are based in the Town Hall in Shaftesbury and consist of



a Town Clerk, two full time and one part-time member of staff. The grounds team are based at Wincombe Business Park and consist of a Head Groundsman, Senior Groundsman and 2 groundsmen. The swimming pool staff member is the Pool Manager and seasonal staff are engaged for the pool season from May to September each year.

Andy writes;

In my report for 2016/17 I wrote the following

'The last municipal year has been a very difficult year for the HR Committee.

We have had a significant staffing issue to deal with, which we did with grace and professionalism.

We instigated various recruitment processes to appoint a community focused town clerk within a commercially challenging economic environment and some internal headwinds, which have been distracting and energy sapping for a group of committed volunteers.

We have had significant changes within the committee – sadly Mr Tippins and Mrs Francis decided to seek fulfilment outside the HR committee and the Full Council – the HR Committee wishes them both every happiness.

So what's changed since my last report..................Quite simply - the culture, the style, the organisation and way we work – the air that we breath.

Specifically, we have:

- Reorganised the office and we believe we now have a council administration team that is fit for purpose and the future challenges that our council and community will surely face
- Welcomed two fantastic new members of staff Zoe Moxham to strengthen our Administration Team and Brie Logan as our Business Manager

- Supported Claire to continue to grow and develop into the excellent Town Clerk that we always believed she would be and that Shaftesbury deserves and needs
- Supported Tracy to be the spine of our continuously improving processes so that we can serve our community more effectively
- · Implemented six monthly staff meetings that are highly focused and fully inclusive
- Helped the Grounds Team to achieve their usual exceptional standard of work despite people resourcing pressures due to illness thankfully we are now back to full fighting strength.
- Designed and implemented The Shaftesbury Council Principles of Belief as attached and signed unanimously by the Council

WESTMINSTER MEMORIAL WORKING GROUP - COUNCILLOR ANTHONY AUSTIN

2017 was a fantastic year for a huge number of people living in the Shaftesbury and North Dorset community.

The Westminster Memorial Hospital was under the threat of losing its "Community Hospital Beds". At the end of 2016, following a huge public campaign, there was nothing to do but wait for the decision about the hospital's future to be announced by the Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group in September 2017. Despite a brilliant campaign run by the Save Our Beds leader, Julian Prichard, and a huge team of Volunteers he had harnessed, cajoled and pressed into service, the outcome was totally unpredictable.

The Town Council Group, set up to oversee the processes of defending the situation, has members from just about every council (Parish and Town) both in South West Wiltshire and in North Dorset; our MP, Simon Hoare and, from South West Wiltshire, Andrew Murrison, not to forget many groups having an involvement with the Hospital had been hugely supportive. Every Market Day people at the Town Hall had signed the Consultation Document and we ended with 6,000 sent in to stake our claim to keeping the beds. The support from every corner of the community was overwhelming. The Hospital is deep in everyone's hearts.

So, we waited. The day – the 21st of September 2017 – came and it was a protracted ordeal. The various decisions, and there were many, were announced and the reasons for them given and after nearly 2 hours of nail-biting tension we heard, and it was met largely by incredulity at first, that CCG had taken into account the points sent in and had decided to review their plans for North Dorset completely.

The closures proposed had been put on hold, and the CCG was offering an opportunity to the whole North Dorset Community, those affected in Somerset and in South West Wiltshire, to work with them to find ways to provide services, including NHS Beds, within the funding and resources available and taking into account the needs of each area.

From that moment, the Town Council supported the start of a new Working group (the Shaftesbury Town Council Westminster Memorial Working Group) to help oversee the way the suggested procedures should work. In particular the Group should ensure that there is full consultation and openness about everything and that the two sides should talk to each other at all times. There are over 60 members of this Group.

We worked with representatives of the CCG, the Dorset Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust and we met with Somerset MP David Warburton and representatives of the South West Wiltshire CCG. We discussed the community Bed needs with Salisbury Hospital Trust Board staff plus others to ensure this Group is widely represented and finally, on the 21st February 2018 the formal proceedings started. These move into the next Council Year and we hope to be able to report further successes. Matters are now in the hands of the Community. I'd like to thank so many people for all their support during the last 18 months.





Meeting Attendance




Councillor Attendance



REPORTS FROM LOCAL ORGANISATIONS

Shaftesbury Town Council places great value in the work of local organisations and charities which all create the rich tapestry of Shaftesbury. The Town Council is working towards increased external engagement and building relationships with businesses and the community. Reports from some organisations are provided below.

Shaftesbury Abbey Museum & Gardens

Shaftesbury Abbey Museum and Gardens are all that remains of what was, according to historical records, the pre-eminent women's religious house in the country until its destruction during and after Henry VIII's Dissolution of the Monasteries some 450 years ago. The few pieces of intricately carved stone, of medieval stained glass, of ceramic floor-tiles, and the stones where the walls and pillars of the Abbey Church once stood, only give us a glimpse of the magnificent edifice which once reared over the Blackmore Vale: but that glimpse is about to change.

2018 is about to see the start of a major community-based archaeological and historical project to provide the first-ever comprehensive survey of not just the Abbey Church, but the whole Abbey precinct. This will hopefully provide indications about where its cloister, chapter house, abbess' lodgings, exchequer, infirmary, bakery, brewery, guest-houses, stables, dovecote and other buildings originally stood. The survey, using the latest technologies of laser-scanning and ground-penetrating-radar may even provide clues about the first abbey, founded in AD888 by Alfred the Great. And then, using augmented reality, we should be able to show Shaftesbury's abbey in all its splendour.

The project won't only be surveying and excavating archaeological remains; it will also be delving into archives near and far – the Dorset History Centre and our own Abbey archive but beyond to Canterbury and Lambeth Palace, the British Library, and maybe even the Vatican. Our quest is to discover as much as we can about the people who made the Abbey what it was, and then to tell their stories in a major redevelopment of the museum.

Many individuals and local businesses and organisations joined with charitable funders including the Heritage Lottery Fund to underwrite the costs of the project. Over 80 people have already signed up to be volunteers and 6 local schools have said that they want their children to be actively involved. The people of Shaftesbury appear to be as excited as the Abbey team!

The first project activities – archaeological training for volunteers, and assessments of what lies in Shaftesbury's archives – have already started... we'll keep you informed of our progress and results.

Meanwhile, the Abbey Museum & Gardens will continue to be open for business as usual, every day from 10:00 to 17:00, and with free entry on those special Shaftesbury days of the Food Festival, the Fringe and Gold Hill Fair. This year's Shakespeare "Play in the Garden" will be A Winter's Tale (but in June, so it should be warm!), and we are delighted to be able to announce the return of Professor Ron Hutton of Bristol University to deliver our annual Spring Lecture at the Arts Centre in May. A host of other events are being finalised: some contemplative, some musical, some educational, some plain fun!... but we plan them all to be enjoyable.

Unlike our founder Dr Geoffrey Tapper whose passing we record with both sadness and pride, I cannot write in limericks or blank verse so am using bullet points instead.

 those with serious illnesses are looked after with skill, dignity and loving kindness. Two rooms
 where relief will be found for both residents and their families worried about the future,
 stressed by events which seem too momentous to contemplate.

 - Home cooked food using local fresh ingredients yes special diets, of course!
 - ❖ Some respite for carers knowing that all is well and safe at Castle Hill House.
 - Staff specifically employed to run this service with skill, understanding and care
 - Registered with CQC and with the National Activity Providers Association (NAPA)
- We welcome visitors and volunteers some of our residents have no family living nearby and love to have a chat with volunteers. On a sunny day, what could be nicer than a wander down to Park Walk and perhaps have a time to sit and enjoy the Abbey gardens? Or during other times listening to reading, trying a jigsaw or some craft activity?

- Working with the Town Council towards Shaftesbury becoming a Dementia Friendly town is important and ongoing. The Mayor has taken a lead on this important project which will benefit many – residents and tourists alike as it becomes increasingly developed.
- Working with Adult Services at DCC is proving difficult as staff changes are frequent, decisions having been made seem to be forgotten and contracts not issued when stated – we are still waiting for at least two. New ways of delivering adult care remain a dream!
- In the future we look forward to continuing to co-operate and work with those who are focussed on the future replacement of local health services – not least the Westminster Hospital.
